ON'T know about vou, but I nave long hankered after a ruise around the Caribbean. Of course, it would be easy to find some squareshaped, monster massive cruise ship holding thousands, one that would glide you gently round the sun-kissed islands. But I wanted something more exotic, more unique, more ... out of this world. In short, I wanted an exclusive experience, something to savour for a lifetime. Their craft are things of consummate charm. Gorgeous sailing ships holding fewer than a hundred guests, they actually do sail around the sea, powered by the wind. But still with all the mod cons and digital trappings of the 21st century.
